Dear Mr. Rojas,

I visited today Mess. Higgins, Brenner & Higgins and discussed concerning the release of the book in your favor. Well the situation is as follow, your book I found out sold about 1.000 copies in the U.S. and when I say sold I am generous I should say that a 1.000 copies have been disposed of and as effective sales there may have been about 500 and something. Therefore with the advance of 250\$ you received at the signing of the contract, the sale was covered and therefore you have no claim as creditor in the U.S. edition.

Now let's go to the British edition with Gollancz. First we or rather I must state that Library Publishers did not go bankrupt, it has only liquidated and at the present is in a "dormiente" state. But they still have the title of the contract they made with Gollancz and they made it in the delay termed in the contract. Therefore you can not pretend any more than your share of 50% of the British rights and the other 50% belongs to Library Publishers. I have therefore written the letter of which I enclose you copy to Mr. Higgins today, after our conversation to well establish your rights. And that is all.


When I will receive the letter of Brenner and Gollancz come
