
### THE ARTISTS

ANDRES CARDENES became concertmaster of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra at the beginning of the 1988-89 season. Cardenes has performed with many of the world's leading orchestras, including the Moscow Philharmonic, Helsinki Philharmonic, St. Louis Symphony, Caracas Symphony, National Orchestra of Belgium, and the Orchestre de Cannes, as well as orchestras throughout the United States. He has toured extensively in Europe, North and South America, and the Far East, both in recital and as orchestral soloist.

Formerly an artist-in-residence at Indiana University and at the University of Utah, and associate professor of music at the University of Michigan, Cardenes conducts master classes at leading universities in both the United States and Europe.

Also an acclaimed chamber musician, Cardenes has made sold-out guest appearances at many summer festivals. He has been a United Nations cultural ambassador for UNICEF since 1980, and has organized and performed numerous concerts on their behalf.

A native of Havana, Cuba, Andres Cardenes came to the United States when he was a year old. He began violin lessons at the age of ten and later studied with Josef Gingold. Among his awards and honors are bronze medals from the 1980 Sibelius International Violin Competition in Helsinki, Finland, and the 1982 Tchaikovsky International Violin Competition in Moscow, the highest prize awarded to an American that year.



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

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
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Andres Cardenes first appeared as a soloist with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra in February 1989, performing the Barber Violin Concerto with Lorin Maazel in Heinz Hall and on a subsequent two-week U.S. tour. His most recent solo appearance with the orchestra was in March 1990, playing the Pittsburgh premiere of Mozart's Violin Concerto No. 2 with Charles Dutoit. Since his arrival in Pittsburgh, Mr. Cardenes has also performed regularly on the Shadyside Concerts series, most recently playing Vivaldi's Four Seasons.

Conductor JUAN PABLO IZQUIERDO, a pupil of the renowned German conductor, Hermann Scherchen, initiated his conducting career in Chile with the National and Philharmonic Orchestras. In 1966 he won first prize in the Dimitre Mitropoulos International Competition for Conductors, and was named Assistant Conductor to Leonard Bernstein with the New York Philharmonic. His international career includes conducting such orchestras as the Bavarian, Hamburg, Berlin, Frankfurt, Leipzig, Madrid, BBC, Glasgow, Paris, and Brussels Radio Orchestras. He has conducted the Vienna Symphony, the Dresden Philharmonic, the Jerusalem Symphony and the Israel Chamber Orchestras, among others. Juan Pablo Izquierdo has been Principal Conductor of the Gulbenkian Orchestra in Lisbon, and the Santiago Philharmonic Orchestra, which he reorganized and conducted until 1986. He was Professor-in-Residence at Indiana University, and has directed many seminars on twentieth century music, as well as master classes on conducting in Germany and South America.

Instrumental in forming the new orchestra, he now serves as its musical director. Currently the Director of Orchestral Studies at Carnegie-Mellon University, Mr. Izquierdo will, in addition to concert tours of South America and Europe, conduct in the 1991-92 season a series of eleven concerts with the Radio-Television and National Symphony Orchestras of Madrid.

### Saturday, October 26, 1991 Anner Bylsma, 'cello

Dutch virtuoso Anner Bylsma is "the Rostropovich of the Baroque cello." (The Boston Globe) In 1987 he delighted Pittsburgh audiences with three of Bach's sublime and powerful suites for unaccompanied cello. Back to finish what he started, Bylsma will perform Suites 1, 3, and 5.

### Saturday, December 7, 1991 The Tallis Scholars

England's a cappella superstars are back! The Tallis Scholars' ten singers dazzle both early music enthusiasts and first-time concert goers. Herald the Christmas season in the resplendent setting of St. Paul's Cathedral with sacred renaissance songs from Spain and England.

### Saturday, January 4, 1992 Oberlin Consort of Viols

How could something so viol be so sweet? One viol alone can be wonderful, but several produce a magically rich sound. This is chamber music in its truest, most intimate sense, and Synod Hall is the perfect setting.

### Saturday, February 8, 1992 L'Aria Viva!

The perfect program for Valentine's Day. With voice, viola da gamba and archlute, L'Aria Viva! performs colorful love songs from the 17th century. The times were bawdy, tasteless, violent, complex—not too unlike our own.

### Saturday, March 7, 1992 Ton Koopman, harpsichord/ organ

Starting in Synod Hall, this evening's festivities begin on the harpsichord and conclude on the great organ of St. Paul's Cathedral. The ebullient Dutch virtuoso Ton Koopman brings his *joie de vivre* to the keyboard masterworks of the late renaissance and baroque.

### Friday & Saturday, March 27 & 28, 1992

London Baroque

J.S. Bach created not only great music but also Wilhelm Friedemann, Carl Philipp Emanuel, Johann Christoph Friedrich and Johann Christian. Invest an evening in the family business, performed by the "wickedly wonderful" London Baroque (Los Angeles Times).

### Friday, April 24, 1992 The Waverly Consort

Five hundred years after Columbus sailed to America, explore the music of his time. Ferdinand and Isabella's court reveled in the sounds of recorders, fiddles, lutes, reeds, voices, and a battery of percussion. Our festive season finale is in the Fulton Theater.
