## Juan Pablo Izquierdo

Juan Pablo Izquierdo was born in Santiago de Chile in 1935. After graduating in Composition at the University of Chile he continued studies in conducting with Hermann Scherchen in Gravesano, Switzerland. In 1961 he became Music Director of the Music Departement at the Catholic University of Santiago where he organized and conducted concert and opera series dedicated mainly to contemporary music. For this work he was given in 1962 the National Critics Award. Since then he appears regularły as guest conductor of the National Symphony and Philharmonic Orchestras of Chile.

In 1966 he was awarded First Prize in the Dimitri Mitropoulos International Competition for Conductors in New York and became Leonard Bernstein's Assistant Conductor at The New York Philharmonic. During 1967-69 he was Resident Conductor for Opera and Concerts at Indiana University.

In addition to the traditional repertoire he has conducted several festivals of contemporary music in Santiago de Chile, Warsaw, Berlin, Jerusalem, Indiana, Frankfurt and has developed an international carrer appearing regularly with important orchestras in Europe, the United States and South America such as:

New York Philharmonic, Residentie Orchestra The Hague, Hamburg Radio Orchestra, Vienna Symphony, Budapest Symphony Orchestra, Frankfurt Radio Orchestra, National Symphony and the Teatro Colón Philharmonic Orchestra in Buenos Aires, National Symphony and Philharmonic Orchestra in Santiago de Chile, The Chilean Chamber Orchestra, The National Symphony of Brazil, East Berlin Symphony Orchestra, Leipzig Radio Orchestra, Dresden Philharmonic Orchestra, Stuttgart Radio Orchestre Kol Israel Jerusalem, The Beethovenhalle Orchestra in Bonn, Warsaw Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestre National in Paris and others.
